This has been discussed in a few threads over the past couple of years.

BYU does NOT have a future series with Notre Dame. I think the story is that Holmoe failed to follow up with Notre Dame after BYU made switch in schedule to helpout the Irish. I'm not saying whether it is true or not, but if I remember prior threads correctly, that seems to have been the issue. I think Val Hale had a good relationship with Notre Dame, but he was fired shortly after the start of the 2004 season -- the last time the Irish played in Provo. When Holmoe came on, BYU still had the return trip to South Bend.

National Champs had BYU and ND playing for a long time, I think mostly because some Irish fan sites thought the game was on.

I used to visit an Irish fan site, and they seemed to be okay with playing BYU -- most posters on the site seemed to prefer playing BYU over Boston College because BC fans were "morons."

I wish we would see a renewal of the series, but I don't see the two teams playing (barring a bowl match-up) anytime in the next 10 or 12 years -- at least.

I think part of the issue was that when ND played at AFA, the MTN contract prevented most ND fans from being able to view the game. That would make ND hesitant to do a future home & home series with any MWC team.

Also, ND always schedules seven home games every year. Now they've started to limit their away games to four at the opponents' field and then one at a "neutral" site in an area where they like to recruit - like Texas. An example of this is their scheduled neutral site game against WSU.

How would it be to have a program where you only actually play four games at the opponents' venue every year. BTW I believe the NCAA requirements require a minimum of four away games in order to be bowl eligible. They probably call that the ND rule.

When was the last time Florida played anyone of significance (other than FSU) OOC?
I did a little research for the last 10 years of Florida football (since 1998) and aside from FSU, they have played Miami (FL) twice. That's it as far as non-BCS OOC games. They have played a lot of directional schools (EMU, WMU, UCF before they went to the Big East, NE La, WKy, WCarolina) They have played some semi-tough teams depending on the year, though the teams were not necessarily "good teams" the year Florida played them such as UAB, Marshall, So Miss, La Tech and Troy; and then the patsies like SJSU, MTSU, FAMU, Ohio, Ball State Fighting Letterman's, and the Citadel. I think you'll find similar slates for most "big name" schools as well as those that thrive of the success of top-tier teams simply because of their conference affiliation (see Kansas State, Duke, Baylor et al.) It seems to be a perk of being in the Big Money Club...you can schedule patsies and everyone seems to not care by and large.

Former Utah State Athletic director Randy Spetman had a good relationship with Tom Holmoe probably factors more than anything on why BYU is willing to travel to Logan in 2008 and 2010. From purely a college athletics business perspective it only makes sense for BYU to insist that Utah State play all games in the series in Provo, the same holds true for Utah to insist that all future games with the Aggies be played in Rice-Eccles Stadium. Both schools do financially much better by playing the Aggies in the bigger stadiums they call home

But Utah State still has more political power both with BYU's Board of Trustees and Utah's Board of Regents and legislative committees than many can ever imagine. There has been little doubt on my mind that for BYU, Tom Holmoe has been told by one prominent and high ranking trustee who is a USU alumnus, that he must agree to; "Play Utah State in Logan or else!" One reason Tom Holmoe's predecessor was booted back in 2004 was Val Hale's inability to work with some trustees at BYU as I see it. This one trustee in particular is very difficult to work with at times, and in the observation of many still thinks BYU should operate the way they did in the Ernest L. Wilkinson era (1951-1971). Chris Hill no doubt faces similar heat from state higher education regents and legislators up at Utah.
