That would be where you said it. Basic statistics tells us that one needs a large number of samples to predict trends. We have a max of two sample classes of recruits and some commits for 2007; not enough to say there is a trend against recruiting non-LDS athletes. Ultimately, BYU has had a lackluster stretch, small media market, long road to playing in a BCS game and has a very strict honor code. This is what turns away non-LDS athletes, not some ficticious, perceived policy.

Also, the numbers that are cited are of people that SIGNED with BYU. How many non-LDS players were RECRUITED by Bronco but decided to go and play elsewhere? If that were a consistently low number, then you could say that there is a policy against recruiting non-LDS athletes. Otherwise, it looks like it has a lot more to do with the decision of the non-LDS athletes to go elsewhere than a BYU policy against recruiting them.
